## Look Out for Enemy Planes!

Have you noticed the watchtower on the roof of the Sanford Museum?

During the cold war of the 1950's there was great deal of concern that potential enemies had the power to make sudden, devastating attacks on our country. The United States Air Force enlisted the help of citizens as observers in the United States Ground Observer Corps.

The watchtower on top of the current museum building provided a perfect spot from which volunteer observers could scan the skies for possible enemy aircraft. At the time, the building was Sanford's town hall.

A 1955 observer manual said, "You, and thousands of other observers in the United States and Canada, will be the eyes of North America. Your reports may constitute the first warning of an enemy approach...At the very least, your reports will help keep track of the enemy's aircraft so that the attack against them can be started and targets in their path can be warned."

An old observer manual, worn by weather and age, was discovered in the watchtower above the museum. It shows examples of the types of aircraft that observers were to look for. The salvageable parts of the manual are on display in the museum.

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# **BIOGRAPHY CORNER**

### Viola Elizabeth Garcia Schneider



Viola Garcia was born in 1919 and spent her childhood living and going to school in Sanford. Viola's grandfather, James Goodwin Patterson, led the Catawba group that left Rock Hill, South Carolina and settled in the San Luis Valley in the

1880s after being taught by missionaries and joining the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Viola attended Sage Memorial School of Nursing at Ganado, Navajo Nation, which was a school designed to provide nursing education to Native American women. She graduated as valedictorian of her class in 1943. Soon after, she enlisted in the military and was assigned to Camp Carson (now Fort Carson) in Colorado Springs, where she assisted in thousands of amputation surgeries for severely injured GIs. She was shipped out to the Pacific Theater and eventually to Tokyo, Japan, where she served as head surgical nurse at the 42<sup>nd</sup> General Hospital. The hospital was in poor condition with insufficient supplies, so her job was a challenging one.

After the war, Viola was welcomed as a hero and was invited to speak to local school children. She was proud to be from Sanford and said that even though her childhood years were difficult due to poverty, she would not trade them for anything.
