BIOGRAPHY CORNER

Eunice Dunn Wilson

In May of 1889, Simeon Adams Dunn and his wife Emily left Washington, Utah and traveled by wagon to Sanford, Colorado. They brought with the their four living children, their livestock, and their household goods. They arrived in July. In the beginning, the family lived in a dugout. On October 9, 1889 baby Eunice was born.

A year or two later her family joined with others to settle the town of Eastdale 25 miles southeast of Sanford. Eunice recorded many happy memories of her youth in Eastdale. She attended school taught by Clara Funk. On her eighth birthday she was baptized in the Costilla Creek which ran a couple of blocks from her house. She recalled running home afterward to change into dry clothes before her confirmation. As she grew older, she and other young people loved every opportunity to socialize with others at dances and conferences in Sanford and Manassa.

Eunice's family left Eastdale in 1909 when the town was dissolved due to water issues. You can read more about Eunice's story and the stories of others who were part of the Eastdale settlement in the Personal History Collection at the Sanford History Museum.

TRIVIA ANSWERS

1. In the early part of the last century, La Jara was sometimes called the Pea Pod because it was where fresh peas were packed in ice from the local ice house shipped out on the railroad.

2. Sanford was sometimes called "Little Denmark" because of the large number of Danish people who settled here.

3. Manassa was called Frog Town because of frequent spring flooding. Sometimes residents were teased about living "out there in the lily pond." The creation of reservoirs upstream eventually reduced seasonal flooding on the Valley floor.
