#### REPEATING THE PAST

Winston Churchill famously wrote, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." As I read from the personal and family history collections in the Museum library, I see challenges of the past recurring today. What can we learn from them? Do any of these situations sound familiar?

In 1916 the Sanford school house burned down. It was rebuilt and classes resumed there not long before the 1918 influenza pandemic hit. Mary June Miller wrote, "Sanford was not spared. All public meetings were discontinued, and people who went to town for any reason were expected to wear gauze masks. A few students did some work at home, checking their efforts with Mr. Soule at intervals."\*

Frank Soule was the principal and the sole high school teacher at that time. He managed to keep students engaged as best he could, and his efforts fanned enthusiasm for education. Teachers have always been at the heart of Sanford.

Here's another challenge you may recognize. Mary June Miller wrote in 1977, "At this very critical point in time, influential outside groups are pressuring to tap the valley's underground water supply by drilling wells for use as a slurry line to transport coal from the Walsenberg area to points south. Valley people are strongly opposed to the plan, but the decision may not be theirs to make. How long will such outrages continue?" Today the fight to protect our water is one that brings residents together in a common effort regardless of political or other differences.

My ancestors were deeply involved in the founding and growth of Sanford — they surveyed the town, delivered babies, cleared land, dug ditches, and did a million other things that we may take for granted today. Many of your ancestors did the same. Over time, new people came to town and added their valuable labor and other contributions to our rich shared history. I invite you to come visit the Sanford History Museum this summer and celebrate our past.
