Holiday Traditions

Recently asked on our Facebook page for people to share their memories and meaningful holiday traditions.

"We picked a family before Christmas, then bought presents for each member in the family and secretly dropped those off on Christmas Eve. We brought pants, shoes, blouses, or whatever was needed." – Sigrun Combs

"We celebrate 4 feast days in November and December. Thanksgiving, of course. November 30 is St. Andrew's Day (celebrating our Scottish heritage). December 5 is Sinterklass Day (celebrating our Dutch heritage). Then Christmas. For St. Andrew's, we pull out our Scottish recipes like sausage rolls, tablet, shortbread, steak and heather pie, etc. and the bagpipe music. For Sinterklaas Day we put carrots in our wooden shoes the night before for St. Nicholas' hors, and in the morning the kids get about an East-sized bit of gifts/candy. Then I coop up the whole feast of runderlapies, oliebollen, Dutch potato salad, breads, you name it, with raspberry Baklava thrown in. (Baklava is not Dutch but it's just the way I like to keep my old Greek best friend in our thoughts! I usually do tons of good Dutch chocolate, we play Dutch language Christmas music, and we all get a chocolate letter. Love this time of year!" - Denise Tucker

"My grandma and her sisters used to take turns hosting the family Christmas Eve party. It was a big crowd with people sitting around the room two or three deep, kids on the floor in front. There was a gift exchange, but the best part was the program and sing along. Our cousins Sue and Nancy led us in singing our assigned parts for Up on the Rooftop and the 12 Days of Christmas, ending the magical evening with everyone singing Silent Night together." - Linda Smith
